UNISON Police Staff Scotland

UNISON Police Staff Scotland, has criticised the Scottish Parliament's Justice Committee because it is unable to understand the extent of police officers back filling police staff jobs, due to lack of data. The criticism was made in response to the [report](#) on post-legislative scrutiny of the Police and Fire Reform (Scotland) Act 2012.

The [report](#) acknowledges that police staff jobs are being back filled by police officers in order to meet financial savings, but says it does not know the extent of problem because they have not been given the information they need to assess it.

New College Lanarkshire earns living wage accreditation

New College Lanarkshire has officially has been named an accredited living wage employer by Living Wage Scotland. This means that everyone working at the college – regardless of whether they are direct employees or third-party contracted staff – receive a minimum hourly wage of £9.

UNISON reps at the college, Moira Jarvie and Collette Bradley, said "UNISON is pleased that New College Lanarkshire has now achieved living wage accreditation in line with the national agreement with support staff unions to do so"... read more [here](#).

Unfortunately, Kelvin College and Clyde College in Glasgow, together with Borders College and North East Scotland College still have outsourced workers who are paid at a rate less than the living wage.
