

Transport Bill

Publicly owned buses? YES - Workplace Parking Levy? NO


On Wednesday the Scottish Parliament will be considering the final stage of the Transport Bill. At the previous stage amendments were made to the Bill to allow Councils to set up Municpally owned Bus companies . We are very much in favour of that (we are also in favour of publicly owned rail so last weeks parliamentary endorsement of the Abellio franchise was very disappointing). Whilst the First Ministers determination to make buses faster and more reliable is doubtless laudable - it's making buses cheaper that will matter more to our members....and on the subject cost.

The Bill still holds out the prospect of a Workplace Parking Levy. We are for strong local government. As such, we would not oppose a general enabling power to introduce a WPL. It is the specifics proposed that are problematic for a number of reasons, including the exemption for NHS workers, but not other public sector – or voluntary or private sector – workers whose roles may be extremely important and who may feel they too should qualify for exemptions. What about low paid women in social care, for example? Such policies should be transparent and fair and take account of people's circumstances, including family responsibilities, shift work, access to public transport. We are urging MSPs to oppose this measure. There is more on UNISON's stance on the Bill here.
